

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

Accessibility grants available

Funding is available to improve accessibility and safety for people with a disability in your community or workplace. Your organization or business could receive a grant of up to \$50,000 through the Government of Canada's [Enabling Accessibility Fund](#). The deadline to apply is July 26, 2017.

Education funding for Inuvialuit

The [Inuvialuit Education Foundation](#) supports Inuvialuit beneficiaries to further their education. It offers tutoring funding to schools in the Inuvialuit region and post-secondary education assistance and scholarships.
